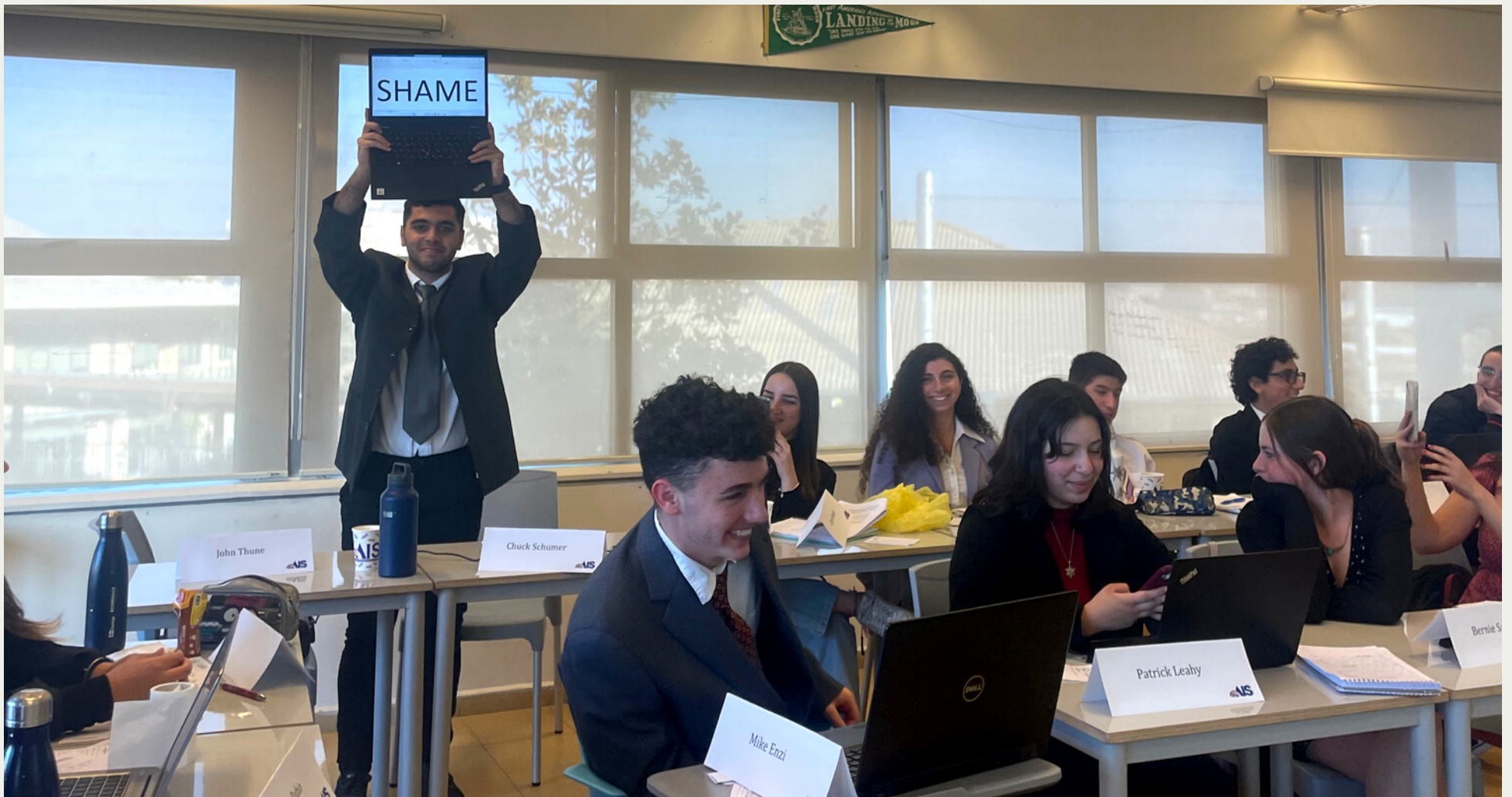

DONALD TRUMP CONFUSES

People with mental and psychosocial disabilities represent a significant proportion of the world’s population.
